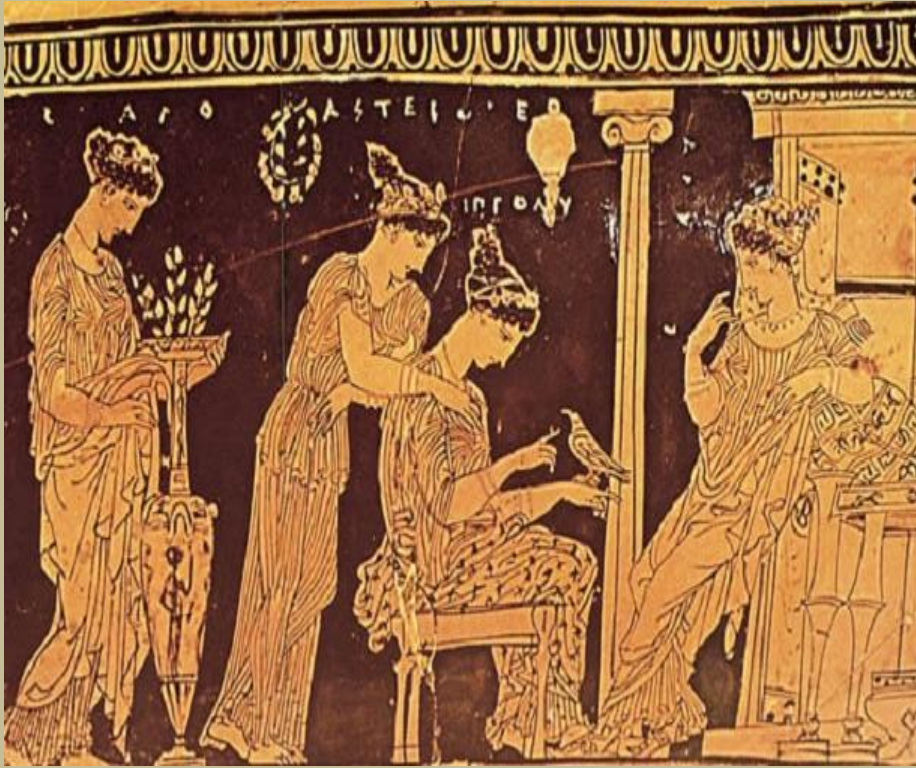


Bathing vessel (loutrophoros) depicting a bridal procession

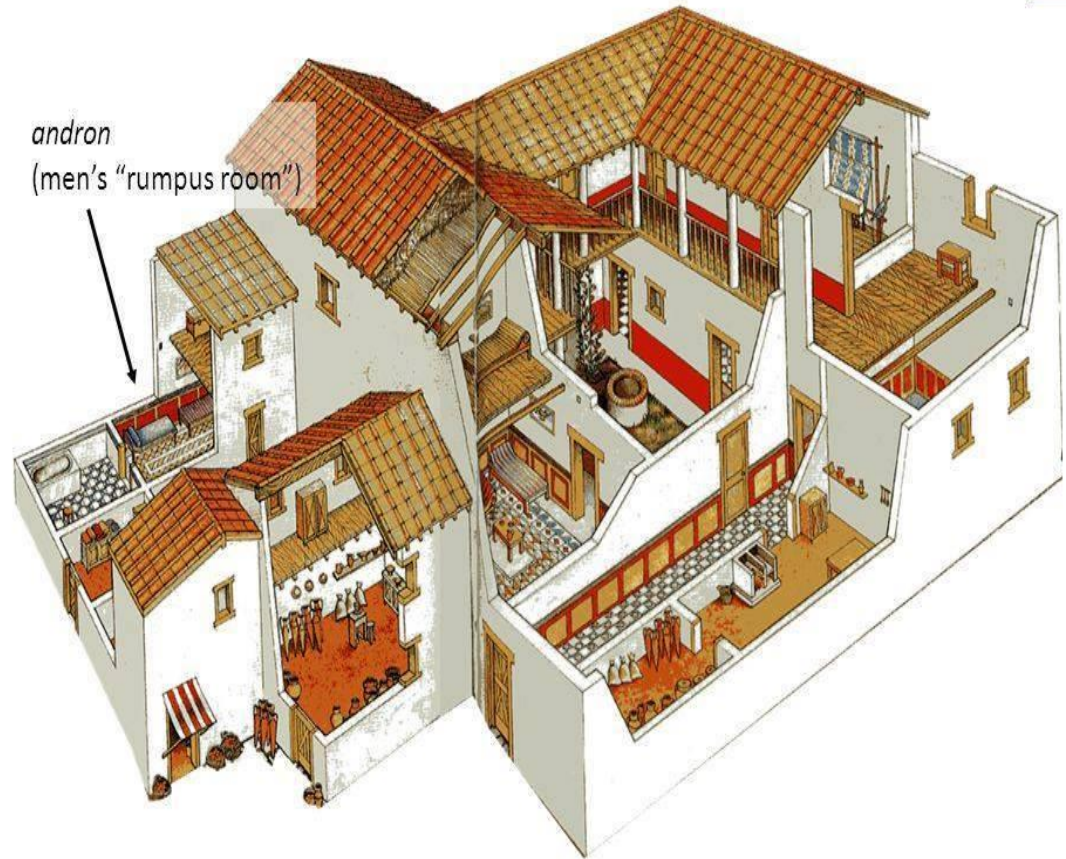
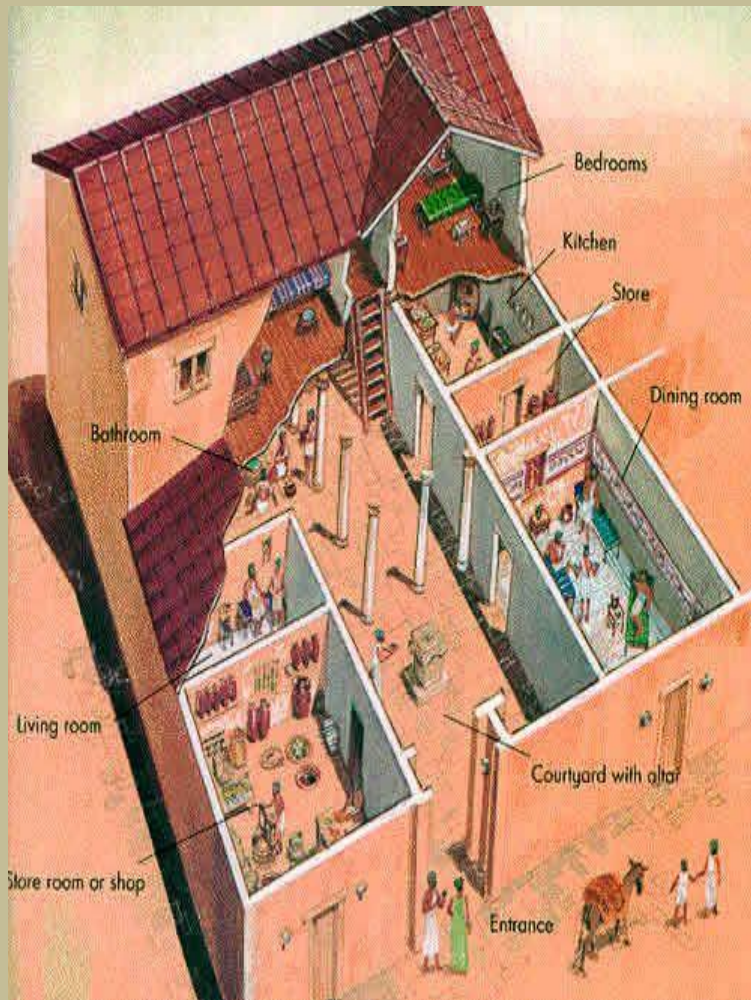

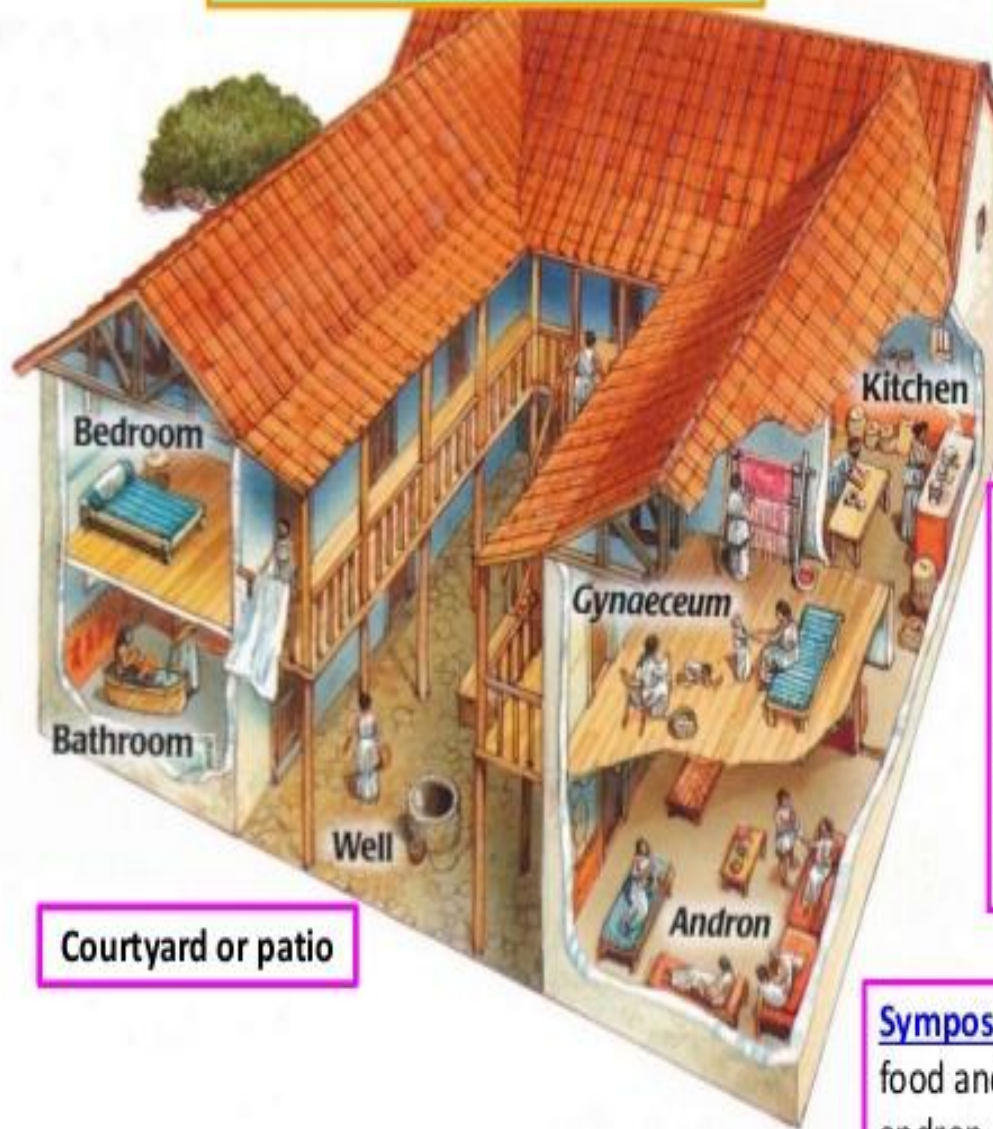


Greek House (*oikia*), Olynthus, 4th cent. BCE (reconstruction)

ANCIENT GREEK HOUSE

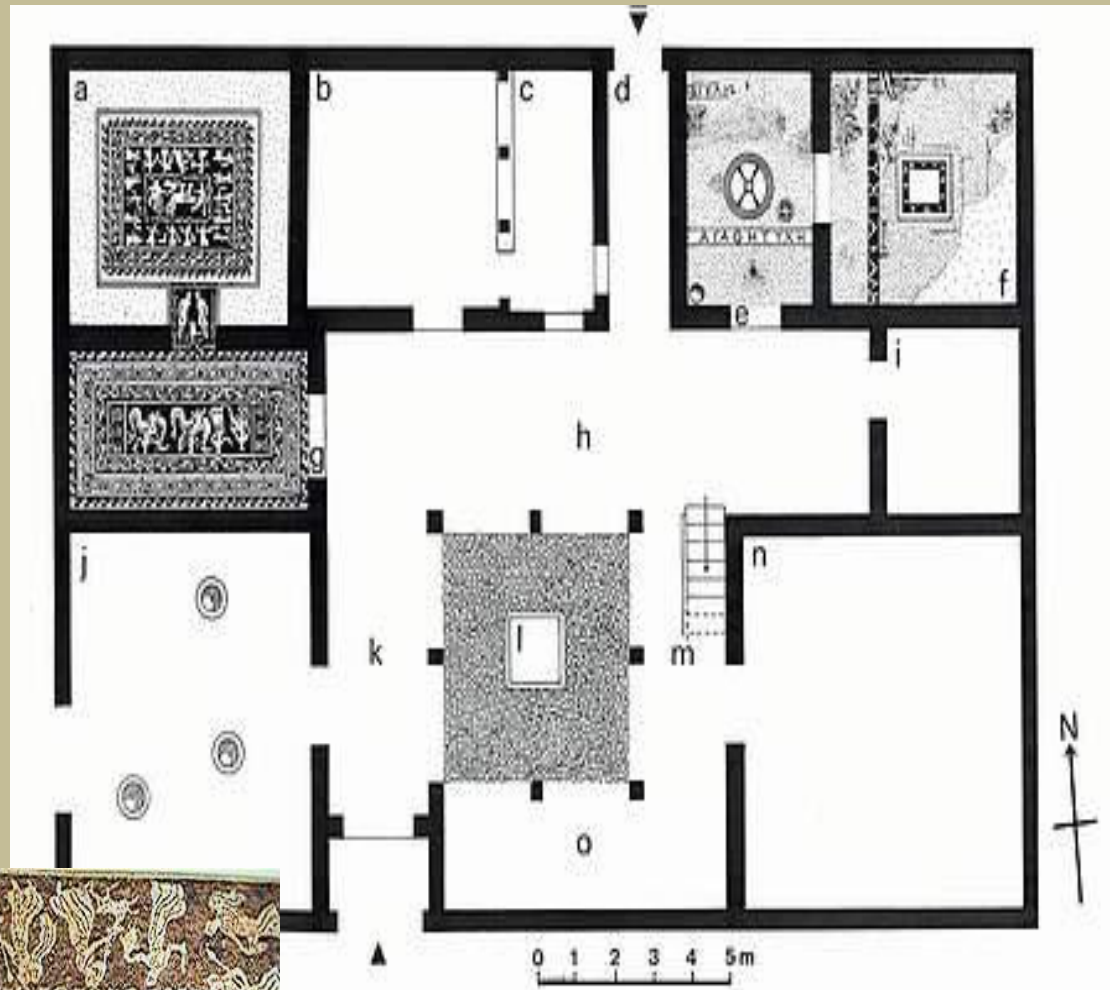


Greek houses were made up of two or three rooms, built around an open air courtyard or patio, made of stone, wood or clay bricks.

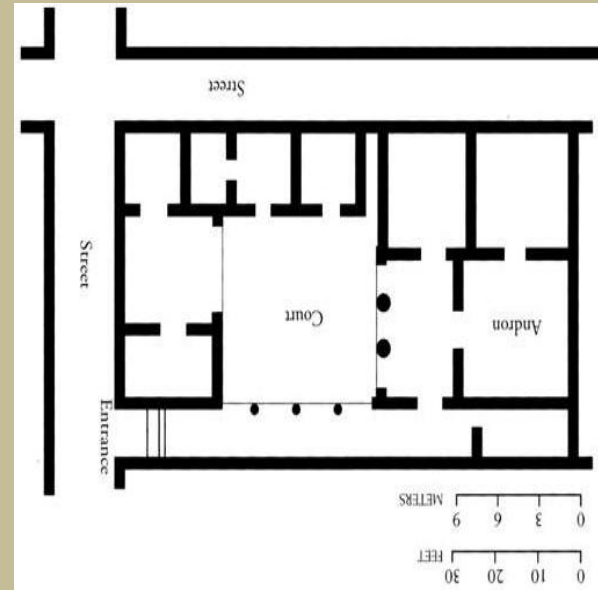
Larger homes might also have a kitchen, a bathroom, a men's dining room (Andron), and perhaps a woman's sitting area (Gynaecium).

Courtyard or patio

Symposium, social events with food and wine, were held in the andron.
