## Noteworthy Effects of the Frontier

- Although they spoke English, they were not English
- The advance of the frontier decreased America's dependence on England
- The middle region was the typical American
- Mobility of population is death to localism
- Promotion of democracy

#### **Problems**

- People in the frontier didn't understand the complexity of economy
- Central power was afraid of the West and tried to put limits (grants, expecting trade, promoting monexpansion, religion)

### Recapitulation

- Whenever there was oppression, the frontier was a gate of escape to free conditions
- Democracy dealt with the problem of magnitude
- Vast resources gave rise to captains of industry
